

Keep right: drive with traffic, not against it. Drive single file.



Watch out for car doors opening or for cars pulling into traffic.





Protect yourself at night with the required reflectors and lights.



Use hand signals to indicate turning or stopping.

### **Ride Guidelines**

- 1. Arrive 10 to 15 minutes early and be READY TO LEAVE ON TIME! Rides will start no more than 5 to 7 minutes late!
- 2. Make sure your bike is in proper working order BEFORE you arrive.
- 3. Carry a spare tube, patch kit, pump and water bottle.
- Practice safety and obey all traffic laws.
- Wearing a helmet is usually not mandatory, but is encouraged. (A helmet is mandatory for all time trials and some Class A rides.)
- 6. Do not "bike off" more than you can do. Go on rides within your ability, interest and experience.
- 7. RIDE CLASSIFICATIONS:
  - CLASS D: For new, inexperienced riders or families: speed 5 7 mph, frequent stops, as few hills as possible.
    Group will wait for all riders. Mileage usually less than 10 miles, but longer distances permissible.
  - CLASS C -: For average riders: 7 8 mph, rest stops as needed. Group will wait for stragglers. Distance recommended: 10 30 miles
  - CLASS C+: Also average riders: 9 10 mph, rest stops every 45 60 minutes. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided by the ride leader.
  - CLASS B -: For more experienced riders: 11 12 mph, stops every 15 20 miles. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided.
  - CLASS B+: For strong riders: 13 15 mph, stops every 20 30 miles. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided.
  - CLASS A: For very strong riders: 16 20 mph, stops every 30 50 miles. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided.
  - TIME TRIAL: Timed event. Again, you must obey all traffic laws. A hard helmet is mandatory. You must yield the right of way at all times. Club time trials should not be regarded as races, but as training rides.
- 8. Each rider assumes his/her own risk on all time trials and touring rides.
- Those who ride ahead of the group are on their own ride.
- 10. Always notify the ride leader before leaving the group.
- 11. Ride leaders should adhere to the advertised speed of the ride.
- 12. Ride leaders are not expected to be bike mechanics.

NOTE: In the case of questionable weather or road conditions, the Ride Leader may decide to cancel the event. Call the Ride Leader if in doubt. All Club rides are rated according to degree of difficulty. If you're in doubt about your cycling ablilty, try out a ride one class below the one you're not sure about and then work your way up. The general public is invited to all events oprganized and conducted by Delaware Valley Bicycle Club. A program is presented by the Club for bicyclists of all ages, all abilities, and all interests. Except for the Freedom Tour, Brandywine Tour and Club picnic, all club events are free to the general public. The general public is welcome!


### WHY JOIN A BICYCLE CLUB


Riders join cycling clubs primarily for sociability and companionship on the road. Riding with a group is far more fun than riding alone, and it is even better if they are your friends.

But there are other reasons for joining a club. Bike club members enjoy sharing their knowledge of bites and cycling, so a club is a good place to learn. For get a different slant on equipment because users speak of it differently than advertisers. You learn the things that no book can teach, cycling technique that make the miles easiest, the best local roads for cycling, the favorite lunch stops, which roads get overcrowded, or too hot or windy, and when. The club schedules rides. You could do it yourself, but even an experienced rider in a new area tates a long time to find the best rides and most pleasant routes. Joining scheduled rides shows you quickly what other riders have spent years in finding out. On tough rides the club will often arrange "sag wagon service"—an accompanying car with food, water, tools and parts to get you going again or to carry you home in case of complete failure.



### How to claim a lane

consider that there First. two widths of lanes, as basically far as bicyclists are concerned: those side wide enough to share side by with a car, and those that are not. If the lane is wide enough, well then no problem. Ride in a straight line about three feet to the right of where the cars go. Don't wander off between even if the lane gets parked cars, extra wide; you become hidden there. It's safer to be where drivers and pedestrians can see you. After all, there's already room for cars to pass you anyway. Stay far enough away from parked cars to clear the widest door that could spring open.

But if the lane is not wide enough share side by side then what? Ride along as close to the right edge as you possibly can? Catch your breath each time you hear a car behind and hope that its driver can manage to

squeeze by?

NO! If the lane is not wide enough claim it for yourself. Ride far enough out in that lane so drivers behind you will have to move past-way into the next lane to pass you. THIS IS SAFER! If there isn't room for drivers to pass you in the same lane, then don't invite them to try.

about Don't WOTTY collisions. These, though widely feared by bicyclists, are actually very rare. Ride as quickly as practicable through the narrow section, and ignore any horn blowing behind; at least that

driver has seen you.

On a street with one narrow lane going your direction, ride about three feet inside your lane. On a street with two or more lanes in your direction, ride smack in the middle the right lane. Make the driver behind you merge all the way into the next lane to pass, so that two drivers don't try to squeeze by you

at once, side by side. You have legal right to claim the space you need for your safety. Yes, you may cause some slight delay to a motorist behind you, but the law is clear if you are in front, you have the right of way. First come, first served. If the driver cannot get by you for a long time - say a minute or more - the law does not require you to pull aside. But your bicycle is narrow; opportunities drivers to pass in safety occur frequently. I can't think of a time in the recent past that anyone has drivers had to wait for me for more than 10 seconds.

Don't feel guilty if drivers behind you have to slow down for you sometimes. They'd have to do it much more if you were driving another car instead of riding your bicycle - using much more space and contributing to congestion in intersections

traffic really gets snarled up.
By the way, it's important visible if you are going to a lane" (not that it's any 'claim it's anv important to be visible otherwise). Bright colored clothing by day, good lights and rear reflectors at right

will ensure that you are seen.
Knowing when to "claim a is one of the keys to riding a bicycle safely and confidently in city traffic. Try it and practice it. You will find that it opens up a world of freedom to you. In riding streets you once thought of as being too dangerous and/or difficult, and in making better speed because you have more room to avoid edge-of-the-road hazards.

### **ACTION FROM STATE LEGISLATURES**

Most state legislatures start their sessions in January, and the following compilation of legislative issues indicates the variety of proposals affecting bicycling that have been introduced so far this year. Where appropriate, some indication of the League's position on the proposals is given.

### CALIFORNIA

A \$1.99 billion clean air/rail transportation bond issue is set for a statewide vote on June 5, 1990. If passed, \$20 million would be made available for blcycle facilities. The League supports this measure.

### COLORADO

SB 1153, introduced by Rep. Williams, would a) create a Safety Council to determine which of Colorado's roads are safe enough for bicyclists to use, and b) introduce a \$50 (\$25 if under 16) annual registration fee for bicycles.

This absurd bill is opposed by the League. It is introduced by the same representative who once tried to have bicycles banned from roads over 6,000 feet in altitude. So far noone has co-sponsored the bill, and it is expected to die quietly.

### DELAWARE

HB 505, introduced by Rep. Roger Roy, supports the creation of a Delaware Bicycle Council, an initiative that has the strong backing of the League.

### **FLORIDA**

Four legislative proposals are expected to be introduced when the legislative session begins on April 1, 1990. Three million dollars are being sought for traffic education (primarily Bike Ed) and the same amount for a helmet promotion campaign. Funding is also being sought for Rails-to-trails projects, and another attempt will be made to pass legislation requiring children under five to wear helmets when being carried as passengers on bikes.

### GEORGIA

HB 1 191 provides guidelines to which bicycle racing on the state highway system must conform. The committee substitute bill as worded on February 1 has the support of the bicycle community and passage into the Senate is expected.

HB 1198 would ban bicycle racing altogether. This is unlikely to pass.

### HAWAII

Senator Levens introduced a bill to provide the Department of Transportation explicit power to exclude bicycles from roads deemed by them to be dangerous.

The League believes proposals such as this represent an abdication of responsibility on the part of the DOT to provide safe places to ride. They are failing in their job of providing for all legitimate road users.

### KANSAS

HB 2288 (authored by Ginger Barr) would require all cyclists to wear reflective vests. The League's position paper on lighting and conspicuity issues opposes requirements such as this as unnecessary, burdensome, unenforceable, and ineffective. However, the statement also encourages bicyclists to make themselves as visible as possible. Passage is not expected.

### **NEBRASKA**

LB 394 is a welcome initiative from legislator Sharon Beck. The bill would bring Nebraska in line with the Uniform Vehicle Code by:

- abolishing the mandatory sidepath law;
- permitting riding two abreast, provided it does not impede the normal flow of traffic;
- allowing cyclists to ride other than as far to the right as possible in order to avoid potholes and debris, and when necessary to take the whole lane.

### **NEW MEXICO**

HB 298, the work of Rep. Hocevar, would impose a \$10 tax on bicycle sales, with the proceeds funding a pedestrian and bicycle education program. The League's newly adopted position paper on taxation issues does not support this kind of measure. The kind of education program proposed should be paid for from general funds.

### **PENNSYLVANIA**

SB 177, a bottle bill, has been stuck for many years! Now, however, a new push is being made to secure enough signatures to put the issue on the ballot for a referendum. A hundred thousand names are being sought by April 1, 1990.

### Pennsylvania continued...

The legislature is considering a law requiring children under five to wear helmets when being carried as passengers on bikes. This was introduced by Senator Baker and Representative Hegarty.

### **VIRGINIA**

An appropriation of \$247,000 is being sought to complete construction of a vital bridge for bicyclists and pedestrians on the W&OD Trail in Falls Church.

### WASHINGTON

By far the most activity this year is in the state of Washington, where four bills are pending:

SB 6398 (Hayner) would require people under the age of 16 to wear helmets when riding a bike.

**SB 6427** (Warnke, Bender et al) would mandate 20 minutes per year of bicycle safety instruction for grades K-6. It would also mandate helmet use for those under 12.

**SB 6434** (Bender, Metcalf) sets aside \$250,000 for the State Patrol to provide a bicycle education program.

**SB 5745** would outlaw the use of headphones by bicyclists.

Bicycle groups in the state welcome the renewed interest in bicycle safety but believe the first three

proposals, as they stand, are poorly conceived. They favor a comprehensive statewide education program, safety campaigns, and various other measures that are more feasible, enforceable, and practical. The time is not yet right for mandatory helmet laws.

### OTHER STATE-LEVEL ISSUES

Mountain Bicycling in State Parks: Many state departments of recreation and natural resources have recently determined their policy towards mountain bike access to trails, or are in the process of doing so. The decisions seem to be either to close trails to bikes with specific exceptions on identified trails, or to open trails to bikes with specific closures where circumstances dictate.

States choosing the presumption of closure include California, Pennsylvania, and Michigan.

States choosing the presumption of open trails include Washington, Oregon, Colorado, Delaware, and West Virginia.

In Connecticut, New York, Tennessee, and North Carolina, the issues are being considered now by state and local officials. In general, states with no specific policy allow bicycles to use trails unless posted otherwise.


### THE NATIONAL CONGRESS OF BICYCLISTS


