

Members Honored at Holiday Banquet

At the club's December holiday banquet, a delighted crowd looked on as Bob Martin received the second annual FX Pedrix True Bicyclist of the Year Award. It did not take the audience long to realize who the recipient would be as the award letter from FX Pedrix was read:

"As you may know, I have awarded my True Bicyclist moniker to those DVBC riders who, through their actions, have shown a devotion to both cycling and the bicycle itself, almost at times to the exclusion of personal safety, comfort, or sometimes family harmony. The True Cyclist is one who rides on freezing cold days, in blistering heat, and at night, or one whose first words after a fall or accident are, "Is my bike alright?"

Although we spent many long hours discussing our selection this year, in the end the Committee's choice was simple. Our choice displays all the True Bicyclist qualities and then some. This year's winner:

- · Commutes to work by bike.
- Is a gifted and intuitive bike mechanic.
- When riding, if he spots an old bike in somebody's trash, salvages useful parts (although we understand that his wife has threatened him if he brings home any more old bikes).
- Has been a fixture on the local bicycling scene and in the DVBC for many years.
- We are told that over his (and his wife's) bedroom door is a sign that says "Bicyclists dismount before entering."

- On club rides, he's always eager to help fellow riders with their mechanical problems & wait for stragglers so they don't get lost.
- But most of all, he can be seen riding for the sheer joy of riding not to show off or to beat any one. When you ride with him, you can always sense this joy (mainly because he never stops whistling a happy tune).

And Richard White received the Bonkers Roadkill award in only his first year of trying.

Ride Guidelines

- Arrive early and be ready to leave on time. Rides start no more than 5-7 minutes late.
- Make sure your bike is in proper working order before you arrive. 2.
- Carry a spare tube, patch kit, and water bottle. 3.
- Practice safety and obey all traffic laws. 4.
- A helmet is mandatory for all DVBC rides.
- All Club rides are rated according to the degree of difficulty. Do not "bike off" more than you can do. Go on rides within your ability, interest and experience. If you're in doubt about your ability, try out a ride one class below the one you're not sure of and work your way up.

Ride classifications:

Class D: For new, inexperienced riders or families: 7-9 mph average moving speed with frequent stops and as few hills as possible. The group will wait for all riders. The ride lengths are usually less than 10 miles, but longer distances are permissible.

Class C-: For average riders: 10-11 mph average moving speed with rest stops as needed. The group will wait for stragglers. The recommended distance is 10-30 miles.

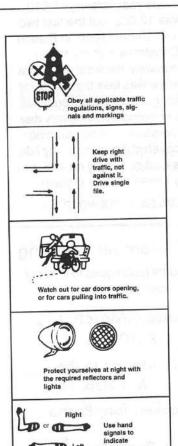
Class C+: Also for average riders: 12-13 mph average moving speed with rest stops every 45-60 minutes. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided.

Class B-: For more experienced riders: 14-15 mph average moving speed with rest stops at the discretion of the ride leader. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided.

Class B+: For strong riders: 16-18 mph average moving speed with rest stops at the discretion of the ride leader. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided. Class A: For very strong riders: 18+ mph average moving speed with rest stops at the discretion of the ride leader. No obligation to wait for stragglers if cue sheets or maps are provided.

- Each rider assumes his/her own risk on all rides.
- Those who ride ahead of the group are on their own ride. 9
- 10. Always notify the ride leader before leaving the group.
- 11. Ride leaders should adhere to the advertised speed of the ride.
- 12. Ride leaders are not expected to be bike mechanics.

Note: In the case of questionable weather or road conditions, the Ride Leader may decide to cancel the event. Call the ride leader if in doubt. The general public is invited to all events organized by the Delaware Valley Bicycle Club. Except for the Bonkers Metric, Brandywine Tour, Club banquet and Club picnic, all club events are free to the general public. The general public is welcome!



Keep Your Eye on the Prize

At a recent club meeting, a lot of emphasis was placed on reaching "the next level." Training, technique, nutrition, working out, and riding hard are great ways to accomplish this goal. Nothing wrong with that.

But let's not lose sight of the "prize." If you reach the next level through hard work and commitment you will surely get "the prize" at the end of the ride. No? Isn't there a yellow jersey for the first one at the finish? Perhaps a trophy filled with money and endorsement contracts. No? Then where is "the prize?" I suppose the prize is the feeling of accomplishment and pride at having been the best that day and there's nothing wrong with that either.

But let's consider another prize. You're riding with fellow members at a pace that encourages conversation, jokes, small talk and looking at things. You're soaking up the ride. It's sunny with little wind. You see things faster riders may not see. You feel things faster riders may not feel. You think to yourself, "It doesn't get any better than this." You've attained "the prize."

All of a sudden a small group of really fit riders blows past in a cloud of dust. And they're nearly out of sight. You may think to yourself, "Wow! I wish I could ride that fast." Or, "I wish I was that strong. Maybe if I trained real hard I could be." But be careful what you wish for.

I wonder if those really fast riders recall the training rides with as much pleasure as a not-so-fast ride. Do they think back and say, "That was a beautiful day?" I hope they do, but I have doubts. Besides, who wants to ride with a group that doesn't know your name, doesn't want to know your name, and doesn't even care if you're

there? By the way, be prepared to finish this ride alone should you have a mechanical problem or be unable to keep up. Sound like fun? Then go for it

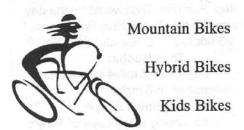
But for some of us, we've already got "the prize." The prize is the ride. Not at the end of it. So with the new riding season starting, be careful what you wish for and keep your eye on the prize.

I started the 2001 year with a goal of 3000 or more miles and a minimum must-do of 2000. Well, I finished just in the middle of that range with just over 2500 miles. I have come to realize that breaking 3000 next year will require some winter riding (just bought the right kind of clothing and put 50 miles on over two days with temps around 35 degrees) and more regular participation in summer evening rides. My proudest achievement was completing several century rides (Brandywine Century, Scenic Schuylkill Century, MS150 Day 1 Century) and many metrics.

I can't think of one ride that was the most fun. Every day on the bike is better than a day at work. Even in the cold, pouring rain of the MS150 Day 2, that last killer hill of the Bonkers Metric, or while my legs were cramping in the last miles of the Scenic Schuylkill Century. That 3000+ goal is going to be mine in 2002:-)

Glenn Lyons:

Total Miles for 2001: 6374.

I am proudest of my time of 7:21 in the Brandywine Bicycle Club Time
Trial. My most fun ride was probably a trial run of my "Cross County Tour" in November with Rich Alejandre, Rich White, Monika Sloane, and Bill Robb (Ed Sobolewski joined us for the first third of the ride). I will offer this ride (which begins in southeastern Chester County and crosses into Lancaster and Berks Counties) in the newsletter this spring.

Woody Kotch:

Miles this year: 4033.

Best ride...The first day of the MS 150 City to Shore with my son Jason as he completed his first century. Worst ride...The second day of the MS-150 City to Shore. Rain all day, 50 degrees, and hypothermia. Shivering and so cold I couldn't open my power bars!

Javier Pazos:

2001 mileage: Probably less than 10,000. The only bike that I have accurate numbers on is my regular commuter bike, and it has 6,500 miles since I got it in late February. I estimate that, between the other three bikes, there's about 3,000 miles.

Most challenging ride: The Mt. Evans Hill Climb.

Most memorable ride: My family's annual bike ride/reunion. Every year my father organizes a reunion of my brothers, sisters, cousins, etc., to ride down to the beach. We party it up and then pay for it the next day when we ride home. It's usually the highlight of the year.

Bill Pashinski:

2663 miles.

Proudest achievement: following Bob LaDrew up both sides of Welsh Mountain.

Fun ride: Riding 32 miles in the rain with Bob Leon and Bob LaDrew and coming in 3rd.

Larry Green:

My total mileage for 2001 was 4880. My most-fun rides were at Eddy Farm in the New York- New Jersey-Pennsylvania junction with Woody Kotch and Bob Ingersol in June. My proudest achievement was to be the first in my group to reach the peak of Col d'Iseran (hors categorie, the highest alpine pass) in the snow in August. My worst ride was the terror of descending my first major alpine col—Col de Coyelle-shivering all the way, trying somehow to pedal or something to get warm.

Rich Alejandre:

I hadn't planned on divulging my 2001 biking summary, but I did proudly achieve my goal of 200 rides for the year (actually, 206). And, a "ride" for me is a journey of at least two hours in duration on a bike. Mileage? I have no idea.

Bob Blackburn:

It was one of those years. A nagging knee problem in the spring and working seven days a week in the fall caused major shifts in workout schedules. So here is how it ended up: Cycling 947 miles, swimming 30k yards, and running 625 miles. Weight training and martial arts were the other major activities. I averaged just over five hours a week of exercise. I guess it came out pretty good considering I had 5-6 months of restricted workouts. The best part of cycling this year was the purchase of the Lemond Zurich with the first ride being the Bonkers Metric.

Pete LaVerghetta:

We didn't keep a log in 2001—kind of a slow year—but I'd estimate that I rode about 2,000 miles, with Ceil riding about 750. My proudest achievement was taking blind kids for tandem rides, something I've done one day each year for about the past four or five years. I should do it more often. It was a lot of fun and the kids had a great time, asking us to go "faster, use a higher gear!" The most fun was our vacation to the Finger Lakes region of New York, visiting wineries and riding bikes. Hope to see you on the road in 2002.

Ann Martha:

Each of my three bikes has an odometer. All three odometers broke last year, so I have no mileage to report. Moral of this story: check odometer batteries and record your mileage before the batteries fail. My biggest achievement was completing this year's MS 150 and riding the entire Sunday ride, all 78 miles, in the cold, damp and rain. I never rode that far in the rain before. I never rode 60 miles through the rain with a Wawa plastic bag wrapped over my helmet before, either. The moral of the story: pack a full set of foul weather clothes for the MS 150.

Lew Ryan:

I did not break 5000 but I was close with 4820.

Best ride: MS 150 in New Jersey. It was a great 100 going down, the worst 75 of my life coming back on Sunday in the rain and cold (*#*#!!).

Bob Leon:

5,348 miles. Proudest: making over 5,000 miles. Worst: MS150 return trip. Fun ride: That would be the day we had the Club Jersey Ride—about 25 riders in the new club jersey.

Tony Rocha:

I did 6528.2 miles with a total average of 16.8 mph.

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DVBC Kicks Off New Time Trial Season

For the 2002 season, time trials will be held the second Sunday of each month beginning March, with a Kountry Kitchen breakfast ride to follow.



The DVBC time trial course is a relatively flat, 5.1-mile route. It begins at the intersection of Rtes. 662 and 601, at the Purelands

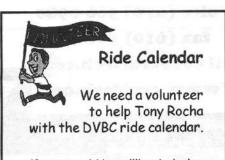
Industrial Park, near Swedesboro.

There are seven time trial categories: Youthful (ages 18-34, M & F), Masters (Ages 35-49, M & F), and Seniors (50+, M & F). All tandems fall together into a seventh group.

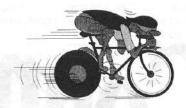
The champion in each category will be determined by the sum of the three fastest times of each competitor. No one is eligible for the championship unless they have participated in three time trials. Riders may participate in as many as they want without penalty. An individual's fastest three times are counted; the rest are discarded.

The course record is a one-time event, with no minimum number of performances required. Of course, non-members' times do not count because, for insurance reasons, non-members are not allowed to participate. A tandem course record would not override a course record by an individual.

The current, official course record is 12:39, set in 2001 by DVBC member Charles Fitzgerald.

with another club member, saw some fantastic scenery as we switched back and forth along the country roads, and completed my first metric century.

Jan Chadwick:

Miles for 2001: 3,025. Proudest achievement: finishing the most miserable ride I have ever ridden—the MS 150, Day 2, the hypothermia day. Most fun ride: most rides are fun! But I always enjoy riding to the US Pro Championship and watching the race, then watching Bob Martin schlep all our stuff home on his now overweighted bike.

Ira Josephs:

Total: 4600, 97 less than last year, although about 340 more of those miles were commuting. I commuted by bike almost every day, which is really nice, and increased from a measly 4-mile ride to coming home a longer way and making it six. Another highlight was riding to the US Pro Race this year. I've never missed attending and I usually bring my bike and ride around, but this is the first time I'd ridden there in maybe ten years.

The lowlights would have to be the number of times my 12-year-old Olmo, with over 20,000 miles on it, failed me. The rear derailleur cable broke on a ride in February; but it was a cold rainy day and that gave us an excuse to turn around after only six miles. Then in March, my chain came off while descending Gradyville Rd. When I couldn't get it back on by shifting and pedaling, I stomped on it, breaking the rear dropout and chain, and launching the derailleur into the spokes of my wheel. I have to say that by the time

my son arrived to take me home 45 minutes later, I had everything fixed up enough to try riding home.

Probably the worst instance occurred on June 24, while returning from a 70-mile ride to Marsh Creek where my seat kept coming loose. I was coasting through Ridley Creek State Park sitting up no handed, stretching, when my seat broke off. I slid off the back and landed with the rear tire right between my legs, then sat down hard on the pavement.

The last time was in December when finishing Tony's Manayunk ride way behind most of the group. After riding up Route 252 from the Reservoir, just as I turned into Rose Tree Park, my chain broke and I coasted up to the car spinning madly with the chain dragging on the road.

David Bennett:

My year's total for 2001 was 4361. My weight is 15 lbs. more than this time last year. I figure I must be a stronger rider now because I'm able to carry that and ride almost as fast as last year. My most memorable day of riding was during Wally Hertler's Tour of West Virginia. I had gotten ahead of the pack on Route 39 in Virginia. We had started out from a truck stop on I-81 near the Cyrus McCormack Farm and were headed west toward Warm Springs. I have never seen a sight on the East Coast as beautiful as the rocky Maury River in Rockbridge County. When I got to the foot of the hill upon which Warm Springs is situated, I stopped in a restaurant called Ted's for Gatorade and asked them if there was a hill ahead, "Hill?!" the lady exclaimed! "It's no hill. It's a mountain!" And it surely was.

Bob LaDrew:

My mileage for 2001 was 7680, giving me more than 72,000 since January 1990. I don't do the marathon rides of Bob Leon or Rich Alejandre. I just keep pecking away, usually riding 300 or more days a year.

The most fun rides for me were any in which we stopped and had breakfast. I'm a sucker for breakfast. My proudest achievement was building up the nerve to ride the club time trial. This year I am determined to improve my time.

Monika Sloane:

My miles for the year are 6045. A couple of my memorable rides this year were:

- 1. Finishing a 130+ mile shore ride and feeling fine...only to find out I had locked myself out of my car.
- 2. Doing a 45-mile Northbrook
 Orchards ride (in late November)...
 timing it just right to get back before
 dark when, for some reason, Richard
 White takes us on an additional 20mile loop...riding home in the dark
 thinking we will make it until Richard
 gets not one, but two, flats...and finally
 giving up at 6:30 in front of Cheyney
 University and phoning a friend to
 rescue us.

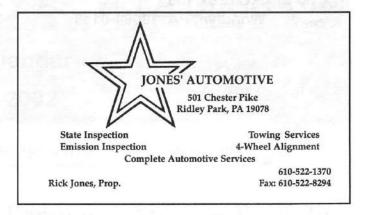

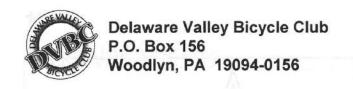
